Building on our previous webinar in November 2024, where Robin Hids explored the evolving language of development cooperation, we now turn our attention to the importance of (gender) terminology and how glossaries and terminologies are always evolving, never a finished project. We will present our updated Gender Glossary and reflect on the numerous dynamics that can determine which terms or descriptions might be included or excluded from key policy documents, resolutions, and smaller documents, such as glossaries. In presenting our updates and the discussions that led to these modifications, we aim to provide insights on how to further make your development and international cooperation projects, yet likewise perceptions of the world, more (gender) inclusive.

Following this, we invite you to participate in an interactive discussion that centers on the role of photography in development work. We will present images taken by members of Stichting NICC during their fieldwork, encouraging you to reflect on what these photographs evoke.
