Meet the members of our Gender Timeline Group at NICC

My name is Thera van Osch. For over 50 years, I have been involved in international cooperation. This began during my studies. In 1971, I did an internship at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Directorate of International Technical Assistance. I graduated from Tilburg University with a focus on the Economics of Developing Countries and also took the course on Imperialism and Underdevelopment. After that, I worked abroad for many years, mostly as a gender expert. Altogether, I have worked in approximately 70 countries, carrying out both short-term and long-term missions (over a year). Internationally, the Netherlands has played a pioneering role in the field of Gender and Development, particularly since the 1990s. This has effectively contributed to global poverty reduction. Currently, there is a risk that this policy will be abandoned. I am glad that NICC has taken the initiative to preserve the legacy in the field of Gender and Development, so that future generations may be able to build upon it.





Anke van der Kwaak is a senior advisor, researcher, and strategic leader in mixed methods research, SRHR, and health systems strengthening. At KIT, she was SRHR team coordinator (2016–2023) and is known for her strategic thinking, communication, and training skills in health systems, governance, and leadership. She coordinated KIT's Health Systems Research Module for over 20 years and now leads the SRHR policy, governance, and finance module while serving as academic advisor, thesis supervisor, and examiner. Anke has led numerous research and advisory projects focused on gender, maternal and neonatal health, FGM, sexuality, youth, family planning, CSE, and patient-centered approaches. Previously, she lectured at Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam's Medical Faculty for 12 years. With experience in Asia, Africa, and MENA regions, she specializes in capacity building, multi-country evaluations, and translating research into actionable knowledge products. She also facilitates synthesis and writing workshops and is widely published.

My name is Iris Dijkstra, and since November of last year, I've been part of the gender group at Stichting NICC as a research volunteer. My perspective is grounded in intersectional and decolonial feminisms. I believe that as we write and reflect on the past, we can simultaneously imagine and envision worlds otherwise — through how we approach the material, and how we frame, depict, and present it in the now. Beyond my work at NICC, I'm engaged in various (feminist) networks in the Netherlands and Europe, as well as in Abya Yala (Latin America).





My name is Ella de Voogd. After more than 40 years of work in International Affairs and the Education sector now retired and enjoying my new life with garden work, reading and contributing to the society among others. For NICC I am conducting interviews and editing these into small clips for different timelines. At the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs I worked for Gender, SRHR, Human Rights and Governance and worked at the embassies in Guatemala and Bangladesh. That is why I am currently contributing to the NICC Timelines Bangladesh and Gender.

I am Kitty Bentvelsen, contributing to NICC as a resource person, mostly to gender timelines. After my Masters in Wageningen (rural planning and water management) I always worked within international cooperation: as an independent consultant and as Femconsult staff member. My working area shifted from merely water management towards also socio-economic, gender and environmental aspects of development, with gender equality and women's rights always as a special focus.



Feminist March 2025

On Saturday, March 8, International Women's Day, around 20,000 people marched through the streets of Amsterdam. A wide range of messages reflecting gender inequality, rights, lived experiences, and demands for justice were written on protest signs and displayed on flags. The incredible turnout serves as a powerful reminder to show up for gender equity and equality — in all forms, and in all corners of the world.

Presenting NICC at Thuas

"On Friday, February 21, the NICC Foundation organized the webinar 'Seeing Development Through Generations: Gender, Photography & Dialogue'. Joosje Seeling, Sofiia Berdiugina, and Iris Dijkstra organized this digital event. Iris started the webinar with a brief overview of the NICC's activities. She then presented changes that had been made to the Gender Glossary, which is part of the Gender Timeline, and the rationale behind these changes. In the second part, Joosje led a discussion on different perceptions of photographs in 'development cooperation'. The participants actively engaged, leading to surprising insights into how people can perceive and experience the same photographs in different ways.
